



ACTIVITY 4: WHAT COMES NEXT?

Here are some of the main pathways, and a few reasons people might choose each route.

Benji has just completed a Level 3 apprenticeship in Customer Service at a supermarket chain. He wants to carry on earning a salary and work his way up to a managerial role.
