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

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Career

The job or series of jobs that you do during your working life within the same sector.

Sector

Group of related jobs that often work together. e.g. doctors, nurses and dentists are all part of the healthcare sector.

Pathway

Route to a particular career/many careers. e.g. university or apprenticeship.

Apprenticeship

A paid role spent working at an organisation whilst learning skills and studying for a qualification. There are different levels of apprenticeship (see qualification).

Apprenticeship provider

The employer who you complete an apprenticeship with. e.g. Rolls Royce.

University

Where you go to study a degree. e.g. Warwick University.

Qualification

A specific course (i.e. Engineering, Health and Beauty, Paramedic). Qualifications are set at different levels.

e.g. GCSEs are level 2, a university degree is level 7. The qualification level influences what sort of role you could get onto later. A full list of qualification levels are found <u>here.</u>



ACTIVITY 1: WHAT DO YOU WANT TO ACHIEVE?

This activity will help you and your coach understand what you want to achieve and therefore how your coach can best help you. Mark a cross in the quadrant you think most represents you below:

• What pathways have you already considered? Why are you interested in this pathway?



ACTIVITY 3: WHAT MOTIVATES YOU?

This activity will help you and your coach figure out what matters to you. This will eventually help you choose a career that will be fulfilling and motivating. It's important to think of roles that you will be happy in and these will become career goals that motivate you.

Tick all the aspects of a career that you think are important to you. Ask your coach if you do not fully understand any of them.



ACTIVITY 4: STRENGTHS AND SKILLS

Knowing what your skills are is not only important in choosing a career, but we are also often asked to describe our skills and strengths in applications or interviews. It can be hard to know what we are good at and find examples of skills, so this activity will help you think about what skills you are developing from your interests.



INDEPENDENT RESEARCH BEFORE SESSION 2: My Job Sector Shortlist





ACTIVITY 1: MY CAREER LONGLIST


Over the next two sessions you will decide:

Good to know:

Many universities will offer courses that combine more than one subject

e.g. "French and History", so make sure you research the courses offered at different universities carefully in the next activity.

Some subjects can open doors to many different careers

e.g. you can study History and then work in Finance, or study Economics and later work as a teacher. Ask your coach more about this if you would like to learn more.



"Tell me about yourself" (optional activity)

"Tell me about yourself" is a classic interview question. Having a polished answer to use in these situations will help your journey into further education, training or employment.

Your coach is finding a Sector Role Model for you to speak to next session so this activity will prepare you to write them an email introducing yourself and help you practice for future applications.

Use the remaining session time to plan what your email will include.

As part of your Independent Research write the full email. It should be about 100-300 words.

Email it to your coach to check and they will send it on to the Sector Role Model.

Remember

Use the three application keys in your email:

- Clear communication
- Evidence of skills and experience
- Evidence of motivation

Your email could include the following:

- Introduce yourself who you are?
- Why do you want to speak to the expert?
- Why does this sector/job/course interest you?
- How do your current studies relate to this sector/job/course?
- Do you participate in any extra-curricular activities which demonstrate your genuine interest in the opportunity?
- How does this conversation relate to your future plans?

Send your final email to your coach a minimum of three days before your final session - ask your coach if you need a reminder of when that is.

Your coach will then check the email and send it on to the Sector Role Model - do not send it to them directly.



 - your teachers' networks
- Everyone has different experiences and opinions, so the more people you speak to, the more information you will have to make an informed decision yourself.

In Session 3 you looked at course providers and it is now important that you know and understand the application processes for University and Apprenticeships.


This will ensure that you know what your next steps are in terms of working towards and putting together an application.

Apprenticeship application process

Apprenticeships are similar to normal jobs so there are a variety of steps to complete in the application process before you receive an offer. All processes are slightly different but here is an example of a typical route.




If this is your chosen pathway, have a look at <u>Barclays life skills</u> for more information and fill out the table on p.49.



Remember: some courses or universities require you to attend an interview before offering you a place.

University application process

The process is one (multi-layered) application through the UCAS website. You can apply for up to 5 courses.



EXTRA ACTIVITIES

APPLICATIONS

Whatever path you go down, you will inevitably face an application process - whether that is a personal statement for university, a job application or an interview, recruiters will always want to find out about you.

Your applications should always include:



Ensure your application statement / letter / interview answers are well considered and well communicated.

Get someone trusted to check your application for spelling and grammatical errors.



APPLICATIONS- DEEP DIVE -FIELDS OF INTEREST

Articulating **why you are interested** in a sector, subject or role is vital in convincing recruiters that you should join the course or get the job.

During the programme so far, you will have discussed with your coach your motivations for wanting to pursue certain roles and courses.


Reflect on what attracts you to your chosen top career.



Remember: It's really important to show recruiters that you have a deep interest in the area. Demonstrating sector knowledge and understanding in your application will set you apart from everyone else.



The research area you choose could be something you have, or are going to, study at school or something you have read or worked on independently.



Find 1 - 3 studies, articles, papers or chapters that are related to your subject choice and really interest you. Fill out the table on the next page.

Summarise your answers into a paragraph of up to 1000 characters.

Prepare a 2 minute presentation about one of these topics.
